Bulky items?

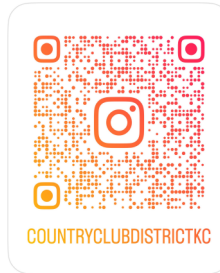

It's fun to team up with a neighbor to adopt a space near your home and help keep our area beautiful.

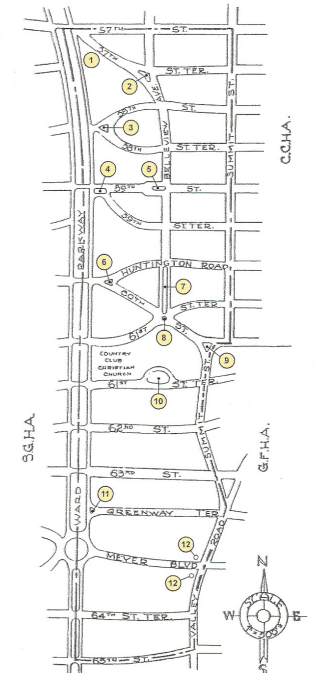

On March 26, 2023 the church hosted "The Next 100" Groundbreaking to kick-off needed renovations that will help the church serve the community for another 100 years.

A BRIEF ARCHITECTURAL HISTORY OF COUNTRY CLUB CHRISTIAN CHURCH

The first meeting for the organization of a Christian Church and Bible School in the Country Club district of Kansas City, Missouri, was held in the Community Hall at Brookside in October of 1920.

Dr. George Hamilton Combs became the first minister at Country Club Christian Church.

The land selected at 61st and Ward Parkway was purchased on April 18, 1921. It had formerly been used as a military camp as well as a cornfield.

On August 1, 1921, a groundbreaking was held on the new site and Dr. Combs announces to a small group of children standing near him: "Children, this church is for you. YOU throw out the first shovelful."

The present sanctuary building was dedicated on January 24, 1926. At that time, it represented an investment of \$525,000

Building architects were Roots and Siemans. The cathedral-like stone towers grace the church, which is of English Gothic architecture. They are still a distinguishing landmark in the community.

The stained glass windows were designed by Charles K. Connick, one of America's great artists.

The George Hamilton Combs Chapel, which was dedicated in 1962, became a major part of the building complex.

On July 1, 2011, work to renovate structural and exterior aesthetic issues with the church's iconic tower begins.
