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Bonus Household Tip:

Some experts recommend draining your water heater periodically. Here are the basic steps:

First, turn off the pilot light or electric heating element.

Turn off the water supply, and allow the water to cool.

Attach a hose to the drain-cock at the base of the heater.

Run the hose outside or to your basement drain, and open the drain-cock.

Once the water and any sediment has drained out, close the drain-cock, turn the water supply back on and re-light the pilot or turn the heater back on.

On September 20, 2007 the Kansas
City Water Department Services published
a conceptual plan called the Overflow
Control Program. It is estimated to take
over 25 years to complete the work of
separating sewer & stormwater systems in
a 56-square mile area in south Kansas City,
bounded by the state line to the west, 85th
Street on the south, the Blue River on the
east & the Missouri River on the north.
Even at the projected cost of between \$2.4
& \$3 billion, the City admits that this
proposed Overflow Control Program will
not fix the water pollution problem,


namely the bacteria E coli and coliform, both fecal contaminates. According to the plan the probable source is pet waste leeching into the stormwater systems that drain the entire metropolitan area, including Kansas communities.

I purchased biodegradable doggie bags online, a roll of 120 bags for \$8.99. I plan to buy an attractive container & place a roll of these bags on my fence. Maybe my fellow dog owners will consider using one next time, in the cover of darkness, when their dog decides to... well, you know. It's a behavior change which will have a significant impact on or environment & health, particularly the water quality.

HOUSEHOLD TIPS

Tip for Cleaning a Tub:

If you have a fiberglass tub, it should be cleaned differently than porcelain. White vinegar – heated and poured into a spray bottle – works wonders on fiberglass. Simply spray on and wipe off with a soft or micro-fiber cloth. After IO or I5 minutes, pour more white vinegar on a clean sponge and scrub the entire tub, rinse well and dry.

Cleaning Ceramic-Tile Floors:

Materials and Ingredients:
I gallon warm water
I Tbs. borax
Tbs. clear ammonia
bucket
rag or micro-fiber mop (your choice)

Never use a sponge mop to clean ceramic-tile floors. It will pull the dirt right into the grout tracks. This makes the floor more difficult to clean. A micro-fiber mop picks up all the dirt that a sponge mop leaves behind.

Cats in houseplants:

To help discourage your cat from digging in your plants, put a little oil of cloves on a cotton ball and simply bury the cotton ball below the surface. Cover it with a little soil. It won't hurt your cat or plant, but may prevent your cat from digging.

Furniture scratches:

If you're dusting and notice scratches in your furniture, the following household items can help you restore the luster:

Crayons - You can buy wood touch-up pens and wax crayons to fill scratches. Be sure to select the ones that match the color of the furniture. Children's crayons, however, can also work to cover scratches. Match the color closely and work the crayon into the scratched area.

Blow Dryer - Use a blow dryer (set on high) or a hot rag heated in the clothes dryer and buff the area until it has a smooth finish.

Iodine – For mahogany or cherry wood, try iodine. Apply liberally to the stain or scratch and dab with a dry, soft cloth. If it doesn't cover the scratch or stain with one try, repeat with a second application.
