Neighborhood Watch - What's It All About?

Officer John Trainor from the Kansas City Police Department attended our Fall Rendezvous in October. He offered many suggestions for crime prevention – many which are listed below.

Officer Trainor had the following answers to questions:

When do I call 911 for Neighborhood Watch?

If you notice unfamiliar person(s) walking in the neighborhood and they are paying particular attention to a residence or vehicle.

If you notice an unfamiliar vehicle driving slowly and paying particular attention to a residence or vehicle. Many times these cars will not have license plates and would be an indicator that illegal activity is being planned.

Anytime you notice suspicious or out of the ordinary activity, call 911.

Officer Trainor said our neighborhood has been blessed with relatively few incidences. Neighborhoods south of ours have experienced a number of "smash & grab" break-ins. This is where back doors or windows are being broken, and robbers taking what they can grab, and running. Keeping a watchful eye on your property and your neighbors' helps keep the entire neighborhood safe.

Do alarms help?

They are certainly a deterrent. Houses with alarm signs are less apt to be broken into than ones without. However, most robbers know there is a delay in the time the alarm sounds and the police are dispatched. Officer Trainor also stated that many neighbors just ignore audible alarms thinking it is a false alarm. Always call 9II whenever your neighbor's alarm is sounding.

What other steps can be taken to protect our homes?

When leaving town, not only have lights on timers, also have a radio or television on a timer. This gives the appearance the home is still occupied. Also when leaving town, ask a neighbor or friend to pick up your newspaper and mail. You want to make the house appear occupied and that there has been no change in normal routine.

Outside lighting also acts as a deterrent.

Whether it is motion-activated or lights that are on throughout the night, both help in eliminating hiding places.

Get to know your neighbors. Attending neighborhood events such as the Fall Rendezvous helps you to know who lives in the neighborhood.

Why do the police come to my house when I dial a 913 area code?

Since the Kansas City area has moved to IO-digit dialing, there have been many misdials. Some people hit the "I" twice in error, or this button on their phone doesn't always register, so people hit it twice. Never hang upon a 9II call. The phone number and address are automatically registered. The police don't know if you tried to call 9II and someone has forcibly taken the phone from you, or if it was a mis-dial. When the call is not completed, we come to the house to make sure everyone is safe. It is better to let the call connect and tell the 9II operator that you mis-dialled. This frees up our time and the 9II operator's time.

Here are some suggestions to help keep yourself and your property safe:

- Call 911 if suspicious activity is noticed.
- Keep bushes and shrubs trimmed around your house to prevent easy hiding places.
- Keep yard lights on or use a motion-detector to activate exterior lights.
- Do not leave ladders outside while not in use.
- Keep your house locked and your garage door down while working in the yard.
- Do not leave keys in your car or valuables within sight inside your car.
- Do not leave valuables within sight in your home that could be easily accessed through a "smash & grab".
- Have a friend or neighbor pick up your paper and your mail while you are out of town. Put lights on timers so that your house appears occupied when you are gone.
- Be alert, not only to your house, but to your neighbor's as well.

Charity May Not Begin at Home

The Pitch magazine blew the cover off the solicitors collecting money and selling candy bars at busy intersections. Not only is the practice dangerous, but the so-called charities are either complete fakes or bloated pseudo-churches with a here-today, gone-tomorrow history.

Many of our neighborhoods have experienced similarly shady scams involving young door-to-door sellers. It begins when someone rings your doorbell and announces that he or she is trying to win a scholarship, a session at summer camp, or some other uplifting experience. To help this ambitious salesperson, you can buy a subscription to some familiar magazine, possibly one you already buy at the newsstand.

The sales pitch may be laced with lies about the young seller being "from the neighborhood" or his/her being "just one or two sales away from winning the scholarship."

Don't believe it, any of it. There's no "scholarship" on the line, no "summer at camp," nothing but a business scam that uses young people to tug at the heartstrings of homeowners. Usually, the young sales team is schooled in the pitch, driven to a pre-selected neighborhood, dropped off and told to canvass the community until another car picks them up a few hours later.

In most cases, the magazine subscriptions are bogus. The magazines never arrive and the company that sold the subscription is long gone before you can track down your missing money.

Several of these teams have been working our neighborhoods lately. In at least three neighborhoods, the losses went beyond the cost of the fake subscriptions; there were several break-ins that occurred while or just after the sales team was in the area.

Also, door-to-door solicitations for charity are a little iffy. Of course, the neighborhood Girl and Boy Scouts, and the familiar kids selling wrapping paper and trash bags deserve support. But beware of other, unfamiliar solicitors. In most cases, less than half of a donation collected at the door goes to the named charity. The rest – quite legally – goes to the fund-raising company with a cut to the solicitor. The selection of the solicitor.
