Good Stewardship for Nature, Our Community & Your Neighbors

Leaves, those little chlorophyll factories that have been manufacturing sugars and storing energy all summer long, are now returning to earth. Those beautiful leaves are 100% organic. Does that mean anywhere they end up is great? No, it doesn't. While leaves are a great source of compost, we don't want them left in our streets for several reasons.

With each big rain event, anything left in the street is flushed directly into our streams. Leaves and grass clippings are high in phosphates, the main cause of algae bloom. In a totally natural environment, a small amount is okay. Unfortunately, in urban areas, our streets, drives and parking lots are all connected directly to our stream with storm sewers.

Enough leaves left in the street will clog the drainage systems, at which time water is forced to be absorbed naturally by our properties.

Generally this water then makes its' way into our basements. Of course the down side to this is the City must then provide more resources to maintain the storm sewers.

What can you do? You can help your community and indirectly yourself by either bagging your leaves and those in the street for the trash collectors or mulching them into your beds and lawn. Remember, while they are a great source of organic matter, your neighbor may not consider them an appropriate benefit if they've blown onto their property.

Be a good steward of nature, the community, and your neighbors. Strengthen our association home values by doing the right thing. **

Help Maintain Neighborhood Property Values

As homeowners we are all responsible for maintaining our property. This is especially important given the current downward trend of the housing market. A well cared for neighborhood translates into a more desired neighborhood commanding higher property values. Below are the most common Kansas City code violations we are legally bound to uphold as homeowners. To report a code violation, contact the 3-I-I Action Center, or Neighborhood Preservation directly at (816) 513-9010. For more details about the reporting procedure, code violations, and other problems this division addresses, visit the City of Kansas City, MO website (www.kcmo.org), Neighborhood Preservation Department, **Property Maintenance Code Violations**

Common Property Maintenance Code Violations:

- · Rotten or broken house eaves
- · Hanging or missing rain guttering
- · Broken or cracked windows
- · Peeling paint
- Stairs that are in disrepair, loose or missing boards or railings
- Roofs that have missing shingles or holes
- · Tree limbs or brush in yard

- Exterior walls that have holes, cracks, or rotten wood
- Garages that do not have working doors and peeling paint
- · Cracked foundations

Common Nuisance Code Violations:

- · Rank weeds and noxious plants
- · Trash, litter, and refuse
- Disabled, wrecked, or unlicensed vehicles
- · Open or improper storage of materials
- Graffiti
- · Stagnant water
- · Untrimmed trees and shrubs
- Noxious odors, chemicals, or vermin
- Off-street parking on unapproved surfaces
