TELEPHONE ALERT SYSTEM

For over a year now, Verona Hills has been implementing a telephone alert system used to communicate with the entire neighborhood in a matter of hours. The purpose of this system is to get information to all households in our subdivision in a timely manner. The cost of this service is a fraction of the cost for postcard reminders of up coming events. It is also beneficial in alerting us if there are any issues occurring in our area such as break-ins which South Patrol feels we need to be made aware of. For this reason, it is imperative that we have current phone numbers for all households in Verona Hills. If you do not currently receive these calls, fill out the postcard located in the back of your neighborhood directory or call Nancy Rusch at (816) 942-7659 to get your number on our phone call log. There is, of course, no obligation to receive these messages, however, you risk missing out on important information that may need to be distributed throughout Verona Hills. For those residents who wish not to receive these calls, there is information on how to opt out of this system once the call has reached your home. Simply follow the prompts and the phone calls will stop immediately.

Early this spring the first version of the Verona Hill Homes Association Website was launched and posted online. With the help of board member Bill Venable and several of his vendor contacts, the site only costs our association \$15 per month for hosting. The cost also includes an "info" email address

which will forward messages directly to the association president and a backup copy to our webmaster. The site can be found at www.veronahills.org.

The website will function as the information hub for issues, ideas and activities within the 750 homes that form our community. The board of directors encourages everyone send an email to info@veronahills.org so that we can build a database of The more addresses we member email addresses. identify, the better we can function the communication process. In the long run we can have more communication and reduce our postage and printing expenses.

Snow Season is on the Way!!



How lucky can we get? Last year provided us with one of the lowest snow fall totals in recent memory. Can we be as lucky in 2009-10?

Your homes association dues help us to pay for "special" snow removal that is in addition to any services we might receive from the city. We have contracted with the same company for the last

three years and we work to monitor their progress and to see that all of our streets are plowed.

In order to balance the budget, the snowplow company will plow our streets if the snowfall total is in excess of three inches on the ground. In the cases of ice storms we have the option of sending them out with salt to provide better traction in the neighborhoods. The snow committee chairman is Bill Venable. He will be working with Paul Redmond and Ted Richards to maintain contact with the plowman during snow storms. The committee needs your help too. If you see downed trees, power lines, or streets that are covered with ice or snow, please send an email to info@veronahills.org. Your message will be received promptly by the on call committee member on their wireless device. This process will be faster than telephone and will allow you to provide a detailed message stating the situation.

On September 5, 2009, a ceremony took place in Verona Hills to place the final limestone post which marks the Santa Fe Trail. Following is an article which appeared in the Jackson County Advocate commemorating this event.

FOUR MONUMENTS IN SOUTH KANSAS CITY PAY TRIBUTE TO WHERE PIONEERS' WAGONS ONCE ROLLED

New Posts Mark Old Santa Fe Trail

Between 100 and 150 years ago, pioneers flooded through what would become south Kansas City in search of a better life.

As it wound its way from Independence, Mo. to the New Mexico territory, the Santa Fe Trail passed through the Hickman Mills and Red Bridge areas.

On September 5, members of the Historical Society of New Santa Fe installed the fourth and final limestone post that marks the route of the Old Santa Fe Trail through South Kansas City.

The post features plaques from the National Park Service and the Missouri River Outfitters, a group that worked to identify the local route.

The new marker is at Pennsylvania Street and Santa Fe Trail, on the Missouri side. In fact, it's right in Karolyn Dreiling's yard.

She and her husband, Thomas, gave the historical society permission to put the marker there. In fact, she said she loves having a connection to local history.

"We said no problem," Karolyn said. "I had no idea when we moved in, but as we've lived here we've gotten to know a lot more about it. It's kind of exciting. It's nice to be able to recognize it (the area's history) in our personal life."

She said she doesn't mind the idea of sightseers swinging by her home as they retrace the footsteps of old-time pioneers.

Elliott Threatt, a member of the Grandview C-4 School Board, lives nearby and was present at the installation. He said markers like the one in the Dreiling's yard keep local people connected with their history in a concrete, every-day way.

"Lots of times when kids study history in school, it's about something abstract," Threatt said. "Jamestown? That's in Virginia. But the Santa Fe Trail? That's nine blocks away. That street, right there – that's where it started."

Threatt is on the board of the Timber Trace Neighborhood Association, and lives on a hill that overlooks the Santa Fe Trail route. He said sometimes he sits outside and imagines a line of pioneer wagons stretching off into the west.

"That was the highway then, and there was no state of Kansas – this area was the dropping-off point where you hopped off into the abyss. It's every bit as important as 18th and Vine – it's our local heritage."

He praised local volunteers and history buffs for making the project happen.

"This is our history, and we've done a good job embracing it," Threatt said. "St. Joseph plays up Jesse James, and we need to play this up. Missouri, and people like Ann (O'Hare) have done a great job with that."

The other three markers are at Holmes Road at the St. Thomas More corner, Oak Street at the Avila Campus corner, and just near 122^{nd} and State Line, where the old town of New Santa Fe was once located. That area was a small Indian settlement, with plenty of room for travelers to camp. Permanent settlements by non-natives began in 1833, when John Bartleston, a hominy and potato farmer, erected a log cabin along the Santa Fe Trail. A small community soon sprang up around Bartleston's property, and by 1851 the hamlet of "Little Santa Fe," as it was known, was officially incorporated as New Santa Fe.

That's when the community's history took a dark turn.

Like most of the border region between Missouri and Kansas, fierce fighting between pro-slavery groups in Missouri and anti-slavery groups in Kansas plagued New Santa Fe. In this area, the Civil War can be said to have lasted from 1855 to well after the surrender of the Confederacy – border ruffians were causing trouble before the war, and outlaws were a problem for at least a decade after official hostilities ended.

Major railroads bypassed the area, however, relegating it to little more than a historical footnote by the end of the 1800s.

Today, the area is marked by the New Santa Fe Cemetery at 122nd Street and State Line Road, where a rut in the cemetery marks the actual Santa Fe Trail.

The monuments mark the original 1821 trail, said Ann O'Hare, a volunteer with the New Santa Fe Historical Society.

"That was the first trail," she said. "The Indians used to take that one across the prairies."



Over time, the trail branched out a bit, with different groups taking slightly different paths.

"The trails are kind of like a rope when you unwind it," she said. "There are strands in many directions."

Over time, other "Santa Fe trails" branched out from Independence through Westport, and connected to the settlement at New Santa Fe.

O'Hare said she's noticed that a lot more people are paying attention to local history these days.

"It always makes me feel like people are becoming more interested in their heritage," she said. "We gather so many interesting people. The public is reconnecting with history – there seems to be a resurgence of interest, and we're very happy to see that."

SCAM ALERT

On both sides of State Line, scammers have called property owners posing as employees of the local water department. After informing the homeowner that the water bill is overdue and that service shutoff is imminent, the caller offers to take payment over the phone by check or credit card.

It's easy to guess the rest of the story. The scam continues because it's working; crooks are collecting hundreds of account numbers in the Kansas City area.

Please alert your neighbors to the problem. And ask anyone who receives such a call to collect as much information from the caller as possible. Any caller ID information is especially helpful. You can always ask the caller to hold the phone while you go get your wallet. Then just set the phone down. Eventually the crook will hang up and you'll get a phone-off-the-hook signal. But in the meantime, you'll waste the caller's time and maybe spare a victim or two.

CRIME CORNER

Your Homes Association Board felt we should keep our residents informed as much as possible on events which have affected our neighborhood and to help us exercise prevention. It was a relatively quiet summer for Verona Hills in terms of crime. Even the teenage revelers in the Park were few and far between. No sooner had I written my newsletter report to this effect that within just a few minutes, not one but two crimes were reported. In the last weeks of August, a truck in a driveway and a home were burglarized in Verona Hills. The truck was unlocked (oops) but a deadbolt was forced in the home.

This is an unfortunate reminder of why we allocate a portion of our budget for additional patrols by offduty KCPD officers. They need your help in the very tough job of crime prevention.

The patrols are probably more effective than we can measure however. Earlier in the summer, a known bad guy was seen turning onto Wornall from the 117th Terrace cul-de-sac. Suspecting this guy had no business on that block since he lives on the other side of town he was stopped by the police and arrested on outstanding unrelated warrants. He of course had no explanation for being on that street.
