### Dial Before You Dig!

Dial 911 for emergencies, 411 for information, 311 for the Kansas City Action Center and now 811 if you're about to dig a hole.

Missouri has introduced a newly simplified process for checking the location of underground utilities. Dialling 811 will connect you to a central clearinghouse for any site in the state.

So whether you're digging shallow for sprinklers or outdoor lighting, or digging deep for a new sewer line, dial 811 before you sink the first shovel.

### Note the Change to Your Homes Association Dues

In 2009, your Homes Association dues will accrue interest in a monthly basis, starting on February. So don't forget to send your checks in during January. Your timely payment will prevent additional interest charges being added to your bill.

Your Homes Association dues go to funding things like the Fall Rendezvous, Annual Membes Meeting, snow removal, members newsletter production and mailing, annual Garage Sale advertising and signs. Remember, your Homes Association works for you.

Properties with dues in excess of \$100 in arrears are subject to an additional \$100 fine and a property lien filing with Jackson County.

Those home owners with overdue association dues cannot vote in any Country Club Homes election.

# **Good Neighbor Patrol**

In the May newsletter, we mentioned that residents were interested in the possibility of a security patrol, and that the Board would check into it. CCHA is not advocating Good Neighbor Patrol but provides this information as food for thought for anyone interested in additional residential security.

The best option seems to be the Good Neighbor Patrol, provided by Orion Security Service. Their organization provides security patrols of Westwood Park. Good Neighbor Patrol started more than 20 years ago in 1987, in response to a rash of home burglaries in their neighborhood. The underlying concept has been that neighborhoods are more secure if patrolled by a security service.

Good Neighbor Patrol has 78 members, in the neighborhood bounded by Sunset Drive, 58th Terrace, Wornall Road & Ward Parkway. They now provide 2-1/2 hours of random patrolling daily to enhance security in that area. The amount of time is a function of revenues. With more members.

the patrolling time would be increased.

In addition to the random patrolling, members of Good Neighbor Patrol may call Orion Security Service about suspicious activity and Orion will respond. A vacation watch is also available to Good Neighbor members. During its random patrolling, Orion will check specifically on the home of a member requesting the vacation watch service.

For members who have provided an e-mail address, Good Neighbor Patrol sends out messages alerting members when the organization becomes aware of crimes in the area. There is a bi-annual newsletter that includes member information, crime statistics, and other items of interest.

Membership dues are \$30.00 per month, billed quarterly. Of course, no guarantee of security is made.

# A more than useful number.

### Dialing 311 is the way to get things done with City services.

The 3-I-I Action Center is your central point of contact for Kansas City services. If you need information, have concerns or questions, need to request a City service or report a problem with City services, you can contact the Action Center by dialling 3-I-I, between 7a.m. and 8 p.m. on weekdays and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday. You may leave a recorded message after office hours. You can also connect to the office via e-mail, at actioncenter@kcmo.org.

## What happens when you make a Request for Service:

- When appropriate, a request for services (RFS) will be completed by the customer service representative.
- · Each service request is assigned a number

(RFS #) that you can use to track your request through to completion. You may do this online, by phone, or in person at the Action Center.

- Service requests are forwarded to a key contact person in the appropriate department. The department will take responsibility for a timely response to the request.
- If you have provided your name and address, you will be notified in writing when the service request has been completed.

Remember that 3-I-I Action Center services are listed on the mailing side of this newsletter, along with other important contact numbers. For reference, keep this newsletter close to the phone.

## **No Soliciting**

It's been a bad summer for solicitors. Throughout the metro area, there have been reports of suspicious "salesmen" working the neighborhoods peddling alarm systems, phone systems, and satellite television services. Most are presented as "free installations" with a multi-year "low monthly service fee".

Many of the salesmen wear uniform shirts or carry badges with logos for "Pinnacle" or "Centurion", many with some reference to "GE Systems".

While some of these door-to-door representatives may be selling legitimate services, many are simply casing the neighborhood and its houses for future burglaries.

One group, posing as cable company technicians, rang doorbells and announced to homeowners, "You'll see us in the neighborhood, working in the backyards replacing cable lines. We just didn't want you to be alarmed if you saw a strange person in your neighbor's yard." That proved to be an attempt to clear the way for a series of midday, back-door burglaries in the neighborhood.


The best defense against these practices

is a community of well-informed neighbors who report any and all suspicious offers or activity to the police. Also, report suspicious incidents to your neighborhood block captain or Block Captain Coordinator, who can get the word out neighborhood wide, as well. If we, as organized homeowners can keep the information about these scams flowing, we'll make our neighborhoods much less attractive to the scammers.

Another suggestion came from an Armour Hills resident who legally pursued one of these salesmen after he ignored a "No Soliciting" sign in the homeowner's yard. That homeowner, Sgt. Terry Finn, wrote:

"I highly recommend that people purchase a small No Soliciting sign (mine is 2" x 8") and place it on their front door. The signs can be purchased at any hardware store. According to the ordinance, Kansas City Sec. 50-8.5(c)(5), the salesperson does not have to admit he/she saw the sign, they just have to solicit where a sign is posted to be in violation. If enough people post these signs and are willing to prosecute violators, our neighborhood will be less desirable for these pests."
