Do You Know Where Your Gutters Go?

About 1,000 residents of this part of the City, including many in Armour Fields, have recently received letters from the City of Kansas City indicating that their guttering system may be part of the problem of overload which the sanitary sewer system is experiencing.

The basic concern is that the sanitary sewers in our neighborhood are receiving much stormwater (rainwater and snowmelt) which they were never designed to handle. Many gutters on our houses empty stormwater directly into the sanitary sewers.

Residents are being asked to correct their guttering voluntarily to help alleviate the difficulty.

A public hearing on the issue was held on October 13, with about 80 residents attending.

Armour Fields Board to Erase Racial Covenants

Last July, Missouri Governor Matt Blunt signed into law legislation designed to remove offensive racially restrictive covenants from the restrictions governing most homes associations in many old neighborhood districts in Kansas City.

This legislation is designed to circumvent the otherwise cumbersome amendment procedures set forth in most homes associations restrictions, so that homes associations can remove these outdated provisions from their declarations.

The Homes Associations of the Country Club District (HACCD) is facilitating this effort through Dan Cofran, a property attorney who is an Armour Fields resident.

Under the new law, the offensive covenants can be voted out by a simple majority of the association's

board of directors. Actually removing the language then requires the filing of some legal papers with the county recorder of deeds.

The board of directors of the Armour Fields Homes Association is working to remove the racially restrictive language from restrictive covenants in Armour Fields, in conjunction with similar efforts by other homes associations.

In the meantime, Armour Fields already took steps to remove such language from its own bylaws. According to Armour Fields president Doug Jackson, this happened about ten years ago.

Recycle Every Week!

Effective November 1, the KC Recycles program of the City of Kansas City has begun emptying plastic recycling bins ever week, rather than every other week. That means there is no more need to remember whether this week is a "recycling week" or not...feel free to leave out your recycling bin every week if you like.

So far in 2005, KC Recycles has recycled 12,200 tons of material. Recycling is going up – from about 1,300 tons per month earlier this year to an average of 1,495 tons per month for August and September.



The items accepted by KC Recycles are:

 Aluminum cans and other metal cans,

• Plastic bottles with a neck (look for the #1 and #2 symbols), such as water and soda bottles, milk jugs

and detergent bottles,

- Office paper, junk mail, newspapers, phone books, catalogues and magazines, and
- Cardboard (thick corrugated and also thin cereal box-type boxes).

Remember that extra materials that don't fit in your blue recycling bin can be stacked in cardboard boxes, paper bags or plastic tubs next to the bin. You can purchase an extra bin and put out two if you like.



We are planning our first Block Captains meeting for some time in February, so please send us any ideas for discussion you or your neighbors may find of interest. In addition, we believe in using email to send out important announcements and information that is time sensitive.

Block captains represent the residents of each street in providing information from the homes association. Block captains also provide a way for your neighbors to meet each other, foster friendships, enhance security, and provide a better living environment on your street.

On Oct 13, Kathleen Dorris attended an area meeting regarding the results of smoke testing in a section of our homes association. Not all blocks were selected for this test, which was basically used to encourage and educate residents to disconnect downspouts to grassy areas or gardens to reduce the rain that enters sewers.

Downspouts that connect directly to sewer pipes increase the risk of sewer overflow and flooding. The city is asking for voluntary compliance at this point.

HACCD Hires Ric Delaney as New Executive Director

Ric Delaney has been selected the new Executive Director of the Homes Associations of the Country Club District (HACCD), replacing John Sheets who served with distinction in that position for ten years.
