Update on Sixth Church of Christ, Scientist

Sixth Church of Christ, Scientist, at 67th & Wornall, is continuing to explore alternatives to maintaining its current beautiful church facility in our neighborhood, according to Craig LaMaster, the president of the Executive Board for the church.

Last issue *The Armour Star* reported that the church congregation had decided to demolish the existing structure, but changed its mind after the plan gave rise to neighborhood objections. In an interview with Mr. LaMaster following the publication of that article, *The Armour Star* is able to report the following clarifications and updates:

- The current church, although beautiful from the outside, presents substantial maintenance issues for the congregation. Its rock is porous, meaning that it leaks in rainy weather. Constant applications of resealing material inside the church can address this problem, but the regular reapplications which are required are expense. Due to lack of sufficient funds for constant maintenance, the church leaks substantially inside the structure, thus giving rise to a need for costly repairs, including repainting and recarpeting.
- In addition, the church steeple is in need of major repairs.
- The total cost of repairs estimated for the church is in the neighborhood of half a million dollars, but an appraisal of the property shows that the church has a market value of less than that. Although the congregation loves the facility, the church lacks certain amenities which most contemporary church congregations expect of their worship centers, such as a kitchen

Romanelli Fountain Island **Nears Completion**



By the time of this printing the stonework on the Romanelli Island should be complete. New curbing has been placed around the pool basin. This new curbing will be slightly higher than original fieldstone, to grass clippings and

other small particles from blowing in the pond and clogging up the fountain pump. The higher curbing will also prohibit small children and animals from wandering into the pool.

A new irrigation system has been installed on the island to keep the newly seeded lawn lush and green. In addition, new landscap-





The casting of the new bronze statue has been delayed because our artist has had emergency back surgery. His expected completion time is early December, so the fountain should be in place


by Christmas.

and off-street parking facilities.

- The church board has looked at a number of different potential ways to address these issues and has explored numerous alternatives.
- The church board did not make the initial decision to demolish the existing structure and replace it. That decision was made by the church congregation as a whole.
- The structure that was planned to be built on the property was not going to be a chapel, as report in the August issue, but rather an 8,000 square foot church.
- The reason the project was canceled was because proposed funding for the project was withdrawn. The funding was available for only a limited time period, and the church could

not meet the deadline.

Notwithstanding the continuing issues surrounding the church facility, Mr. LaMaster expressed pleasure with the neighborhood attention raised by the issue.

"I am very pleased to know what impact our church home has on the community," he told *The Armour Star*. "Although there is nothing in our Bylaws that would require us to get neighborhood approval for making church decisions, I believe it has been good to know and understand the passion of our neighbors regarding this issue."

Kansas City, Missouri Begins 3-1-1 System

The City of Kansas City, Missouri has instituted a new 3-1-1 dialing system, modeled aftr the 9-1-1 system for emergencies, which is designed to be a one-stop-shop for handling any requests, complaints or suggestions.

The idea is that this new system will avoid having callers bounced from one department to another while one City Hall staffer after another disclaims responsibility.

By dialing 3-1-1, the caller will reach the Action Center, which the City says is staffed by trained call-takers who will take the caller's request, relay the information to the appropriate city official or department, and assign a reference number to the call. The caller can then track the City's response by calling the Action Center again and using the reference number. Alternatively, the caller can also track the progress of the request by going to the City's website, www.kcmo.org.

The City has also trained a group called the "Tiger Team" to follow up requests and complaints processed through the Action Center. Tiger Team members work in the field to verify that problems have been corrected.

Safe and Secure

The holiday season is upon us and with the joy of the season we should not forget the need for vigilance. Criminals love the holiday season too, but you can make their "shopping" a little more difficult this year by following these easy tips:

- ◆ Out-of-Sight Out-of-Mind —
 Criminals are more likely to target a sure-thing. If they look in your window and see a new X-Box and plasma TV they will be more apt to try to get those items. Be sure to keep your blinds closed in the evening and when you are not home. This will keep the bad guys from window-shopping. Bigticket items should also never be left in plain view inside an automobile. Place items in the trunk or under a blanket, and remember that a Best Buy bag isn't the best disguise.
- ◆ Trash or Treasure If you are lucky and Santa brings that big screen TV, computer, or other valuable big box item you may consider saving the box for a few months. First it will help in case you have to take it back, but also it can serve as a billboard that says "ROB ME!" If you must put that large box out, break it down, turn it inside out, and put it out the morning of the pickup.
- ◆ Do I Know You? So you just left the mall with your stash of goodies, and you are on the way home. You notice that someone keeps making every turn that you make. If you think that you are being followed, make a few turns that you usually wouldn't take. If you are still being followed go to a police station or public place where police are known to frequent, like QuikTrip. If you are close to home, drive on past and don't let them know where you live.

Safety is another concern this time of year; there are plenty of things to look out for around the holidays.

- ◆ Flickering Candle or Three Alarm Blaze - Regardless of your faith, candles are common in many observances. A Menorah or Kinara in the window should stay clear of the drapes, candles should never be placed on or near a Christmas tree, and any open flame should be out of the reach of children and away from flammable materials.
- ◆ Slipping and Sliding With the weather turning cold it is inevitable to have some slick spots which can land you on your bottom. Keep on your own two feet with some ice-melt on driveways and sidewalks. Avoid

products with salt as they can damage concrete over time. Check your home center or the internet for the products that are best for you.

◆ Turkey Lurkey - That sick feeling that you had last year from the turkey may not have been a result of the sheer volume that you ate, it may have been due to salmonella. Make sure that all poultry products are thoroughly cooked and prepared on clean surfaces.
