I Live On A Corner In Brookside

I live on a corner in Brookside. There are two lovely stretches of my yard where, usually in the cover of darkness, my fellow dog owners think leaving their dog waste is okay. This may come as news but the days of "my dog is just fertilizing the yard" are gone.

On September 20, 2007 the Kansas City Water Department Services published a conceptual plan called the Overflow Control Program. It is estimated to take over 25 years to complete the work of separating sewer and storm water systems in a 56-square-mile area in south Kansas City, bounded by the state line to the west, 85th Street on the south, the Blue River on the east and the Missouri River on the north.

Even at the projected cost of between \$2.4 and \$3 billion dollars the City admits that this proposed Overflow Control Program will not fix the water pollution problem, namely the bacteria *E coli* and coliform, both fecal contaminates. According to the plan the probable source is pet waste leeching into the storm water systems that drain the entire metropolitan area, including Kansas communities.

Recently we've all become better environmental stewards. We're taking the stairs instead of the elevator, if it's only a couple of floors. We say "Paper" instead of "Plastic". We sort our trash into recyclables and non recyclables. Here's another behavior change that will have a more significant impact on our environment and health, particularly the water quality: Promptly pick up your pet poop! Discard it in your trash.

I purchased biodegradable doggie bags online, a roll of 120 bags for \$8.99. I plan to buy an attractive container and place a roll of these bags on my fence. Maybe my fellow dog owners will consider using one next time, in the cover of darkness, when their dog decides to...well, you know. I better put a night light on that container.

Annual City Lawn Pickup Coming Up

The City's annual winter pickup of leaves and brushes is coming right up. On the weeks of November 26 and December 17 the City will pick up from in front of your house up to twenty bags of leaves and yard materials. These should be in front of your house by 7:00 a.m. on Monday of the week listed.

The sacks can weigh no more than 40 pounds each. All sacks must be paper recyclable yard waste sacks; no plastics sacks will be picked up. No grass clippings will

be accepted, and no trash will be accepted. This is only for leaves, branches and brush.

All branches must be bundled. Branches must not be more than 3 inches in diameter and not more than 4 feet long. Bundles of branches must not be more than 2 feet in diameter and not more than 4 feet long.

Use twine or jute rope to tie bundles; do not use wire or plastic tape. If wet weather is forecast, cover sacks/ bundles with clear plastic.

Annual City Lawn Pickup Coming Up

Safe and Secure

Safe

Fall is in full swing and with it the temperature is starting to drop. It is time to start preparing for freezing temperatures.

The following list is a good start to help you stay safe in the coming winter months.

- ► Have a winter check-up completed on your furnace or boiler, malfunctioning equipment can lead to carbon monoxide poisoning or a breakdown.
- Clean your gutters and downspouts, clogged gutters can lead to some very serious damage and even mold.
- Unhook outside hoses from the house, use inside shutoffs for outside faucets if you have them.
- Close storm windows to provide maximum energy efficiency.
- Make sure you have changed your smoke/carbon monoxide detectors batteries.
 - Stock up on non-perishable

foodstuffs to get you through long winter storms.


► Get your snow equipment ready, snow blowers tuned up, shovels to the front of the garage, and ice melt. Don't wait until the stores run out.

Secure

There have been a lot of reports lately from our security service about open garage doors. Doors that are open overnight are a tempting target, and bring criminal attention to the neighborhood.

Areas where properties are not secure give a higher comfort level to criminals and are more likely to have increase in crime. Some of the things you can do to deter crime are listed below.

- ► Insure you have adequate lighting outside, dark areas provide the best access to burglars.
- Close your blinds at night, it is easy to see everything that is in your home from the outside. Always make



- Ask for business licenses for all door-to-doors sales people; if they do not have a license you should call security or the police.
- Put your trash out in the morning, leaving it outside overnight gives identity thieves all the time they need.
- Also put your recycling out in the morning, especially those big ticket item boxes, turning the boxes inside out will prevent you from advertising that LCD TV.

Always remember that good planning and preparation can help you stay Safe and Secure!

DogBarkingTips

Is your dog barking bothering your neighbors?

What may be music to a dog owner's ears, maybe disturbing to a fellow neighbor. When a dog barks, the dog is communicating: "Oh look, there's a rabbit in the yard," or "Wow, those kids playing on the street look like they're having fun."

Barking is a common and appropriate canine behavior as long as it isn't excessive and bothering others.

If you own a dog, be a good neighbor and ask yourself the following questions. Does your dog:

- · Bark all night long while people are trying to sleep?
- Wake neighbors up by barking early in the morning?
- Is your dog left outside and bark and howl all day out of loneliness?

If you answered yes to any of these questions, please take the appropriate steps to keep your dog from being a nuisance to others.

Tips and Tricks:

- While your dog is playing outdoors (in your fenced yard), stay with the dog or supervise him/her closely from the house.
- Avoid letting your dog out late at night or early in the morning.
 Even though barking is normal behavior, stop your dog from excessive vocalization by providing appropriate training.

City Installing Automatic Meter Readers

The City's water service department is installing a new system of automatic electric meter readers throughout the city during the next 36 months,

Electronic collection units are installed on light poles. Home water meters are connected to meter transmitters. Then, the collection units can remotely read customer meters and transfer the data to water department billing systems.

The new system, called the WAVE, will vitually eliminate the need for manal meter readers.

Meters can even be read on a daily basis alerting the department, for example, to potential water leaks and inform homeowners.

Water rates will not rise, but meter reading will become more accurate. We are fortunate here in Armour Fields to have a nice big grassy area -- the playing field behind Southwest High School -that we can take our dogs to run around in.

However, several complaints have been lodged recently about our pooches' fecal material in the playing field.

Please remember that this field is used for a variety of sports events for children and adults and...well, you get the picture.

Complaints have been lodged because of unpleasant debris. Animal Contol is now involved.

Please be considerate of others and pick up your doggy droppings from the field! Those using the field will thank you!

Pine Disease Affecting Neighborhood Trees

A pine tree disease called sphaeropsis is infecting pine trees throughout the Kansas City area.

This is a fungus which causes shoot blight and cankers on pines. The most common hosts are Scotch pines and Austrian pines. It usually attacks trees which are suffering stress because of poor site locaion, drought, snow damage, mechanical wounds and insect damage.

Sphaeropsis can kill a pine tree over a period of several years by killing off new growth.

The spoors of the fungus are dis-

seminated during the early spring to early summer, which is the wettest time of the year. They can also be carried from tree to tree by wind. The fungus invades and kills shoot tissue and forms spores on the dead tissue.

If you see shoot blight and branch or stem cankers, these are evidence of the presence of the sphaeropsis spores. You may also notice increased amounts of resin.

Infected shoots tend to be straw colored. They fail to develop properly and curl over, becoming very brittle. Black fruiting may be found on dead needles or shoots.

Cankers are long, depressed areas on the branches of stems. When you remove the bark, you will see gray to black staining and brown pitch-soaked wood.

You can prevent sphaeropsis by planting in areas of good drainage and sunlight, watering during drought, and by avoiding wounding the tree. Remove dead or infected tips, needles and cones. There are also fungicide treatments which can


