Romanelli Fountain Island Receiving Upgrade

Remarkable progress has made on the Romanelli Fountain Island in a short period of time. The following is a recap of what has been completed and what still needs to be done in the following weeks.


To date, a new fieldstone walk made of Tennessee Crab resting on a steel reinforced concrete footing has been installed. New north and south entranceways have been installed. These entranceways will be enhanced with architectural lighting and have a two-foot thick steel reinforced concrete foundation. A new drain for the fountain basin has also been installed.

These are the improvements that can be seen by driving by. The following are improvements that have occurred at an offsite location and can't be witnessed by driving by:

- The fountain has been cleaned and sealed.
- Maretta Kennedy, a local artist, has finished the clay sculpture for

John Murphy worked with Jim's team to show what we planned to accomplish and why the City as a whole can benefit from the restoration of this landmark.

Jim's team worked with Janet Blauvelt and PIAC to offer their support or the request and our need to make critical infrastructure improvements. As a result, Romanelli Island will be safe and solid for many decades to come.

Help in this area, though very much appreciated, would not normally constitute special thanks. After all, it is the job of our councilman to represent the needs of his constituents. However, Jim and Susan have gone out of their way to help on a number of projects — large and small, making sure that things get done when it seems like we keep getting the run-

around from every other City agency. A partial list includes help with curbs and sidewalks, recycling, the holes along Pennsylvania and other streets, proper liquor ordinances in Brookside, and many other projects.

One example: After meeting with other City groups regarding major problems we were having

with broken sewer pipes, we received several promises from those in the highest levels — promises which were never kept. Likewise our other Councilman at the time made a big gesture of helping us, but no actual change occurred. It was only when we went to Jim

and he quietly worked to apply the pressure needed to make these requests happen, did we begin to see fixes on our streets, sewers and water mains.

Most of us know that the City does not directly control our schools. For this reason, one would think that our schools represent a "third rail" for politicians — never to be touched, or it will kill any future hopes or electability.

We asked for Jim's support, fully expecting him to say "no" or asking to "be informed" of any news. However, that does not appear to be his style. He has attended several meetings and is willing to listen to ways the City can "do its part" to work with the School Board and the community at large.

the fountain top and it looks wonderful. That clay has been moved to the Eligius Foundry where the bronze sculpture will be cast. We look forward to the fountain and statue being installed sometime around July 1.

Here's a recap of what's on deck in the coming weeks:

- New plumbing will be installed to replace the rusted pipes.
- An irrigation system will be added to the island. This will ensure a verdant green lawn throughout the long hot Kansas City summer.
 - · A regrading and seeding of the lawn will occur.
- · Once the fountain has been installed new curbing will be placed around the base of the pool.
 - Wrought iron will adorn the entranceways.
 - Some additional lighting may be added as needed.

The island remains a work site and I ask all to be cautious when visiting the island. Once Bryan McBride finishes his stonework he will remove the debris and we will begin the work on the lawn.

How Does Armour Fields Spend Its Money?

In response to several great suggestions from neighbors, we are now publishing the budget breakdown for the year periodically in the Armour Star. A couple of bullet points to provide some context for the pie chart:


- The budget is a guideline in the sense that we will come in a little high in some areas, and lower in other areas. On the whole however, we have been right on budget for the last several years.
- The pie chart reflects significant accounts for Armour Fields.

We often get the concern that money can be cut from such items as meetings and special events. As the chart indicates, we do quite a bit with very little in the way of funds. The reason we have so many special events in our neighborhood is due to the amount of volunteer support we get

from our Special Events chair.

The chart shows a reallocation from Safety and Security (used to be 44%) to Parks and Islands as was promised during our recent dues reallocation initiative.

We do not know what our actual receipts will be until the end of the year. We work with around \$85,000 as an aggregate budget for each fiscal year.

Community Involvement in Education

The Southwest Community Alliance, Inc. (SWCA) originated in the summer of 2005 when interested individuals met to discuss concern regarding the Kansas City Missouri School District's plans to utilize the vacant school building located at 6512 Wornall Road, formerly Southwest High School.

With concerns about the District's plans, this group sought to be included in the planning process for District services in our area to ensure that any changes would meet the needs of our specific community. Today plans to reopen Southwest have been temporarily placed on hold as the School Board completes its search for a new superintendent and plans its budget for the 2006-2007 school year.

Additionally, a recent grant from The Kauffman Foundation, specifically focused on math, science and technology skills, has been awarded to the District to be used to create a resource center at the Southwest building to serve District-wide needs. The SWCA continues to build influence in affecting the decisions of the District as it relates to the services offered in our specific community.

The SWCA's vision is "To support high quality public education and diversity within the student population as critical components of the quality of life we enjoy in our neighborhoods."

The stated purpose of SWCA is to influence change in the quality of service provided by the Kansas City Missouri School District to families located in our geographic area (generally defined as the southern corridor between State Line and Troost), ultimately providing a high-quality public education alternative for parents in our neighborhoods who would otherwise not use the District services or remove their students from the District after their primary education.

As short term goals, the SWCA aims to (1) to foster community involvement to (2) create a high-quality district secondary school in our neighborhood, which will (3) capture and retain students who would otherwise explore alternative education or move away from our neighborhoods.

To this end, the SWCA is attempting to develop and maintain a formal

Help Wanted Advertisements

The Armour Fields Homes Association (AFHA) constantly tries to get fresh opinions and perspectives on neighborhood issues, and we need your input!

We currently have three board positions that will become open: President, Secretary, and Treasurer. With the exception of President, all positions are available for job sharing.

The positions require time, but not as much as you might think. We keep a professional but social atmosphere, which makes it fun to serve the needs of the community.

President

Job Description: The president is the key representative of AFHA, both to its residents and to the community at large. This person will be overseeing all of the work done in the neighborhood, but has no specific responsibilities to manage tasks. The president will preside over Board meetings and be sure that tasks get done. The president will also attend special events and present updates to residents at the Annual Meeting. The position of president is a non-voting position.

Desirable Characteristics:

- Needs to have a love for Armour Fields and for the community as a whole.
- Should have good interpersonal skills and an ability to explain Board positions and decisions to residents in a calm, rational manner.
- Should have an understanding and appreciation for the diverse composition of our residents.

- Needs to have the ability to manage the tasks of the Board and ensure that things get done in a timely manner.
- Should have some understanding of meeting facilitation using Roberts Rules of Order.
- Should have a fundamental understanding of budgets and general financial concepts.

Minimum Term: Three years.

Secretary

Job Description: The Secretary attends the board meetings and captures key discussion points for the permanent record. This person will also capture tasks which need to be done by each chairperson and create the written minutes of the meeting proceedings. The Secretary also acts as the manager of the historical record, occasionally looking back into past records for information relevant for upcoming decisions. The position of Secretary is a nonvoting position.

Desirable Characteristics:

- Needs to have the ability to clarify discussion points and translate these into tasks with promise dates.
 - · Needs to be able to attend most board meetings
- Should have an interest in local history and get enjoyment from doing occasional research into work done by previous boards.

Minimum Term: Two years.

Treasurer

Job Description: It is the job of the treasurer to propose and negotiate an manageable yearly budget for board approval. Once a budget is determined, the treasurer will approve and submit monthly expenses to the Homes Association of the Country Club District (HACCD) for processing. The treasurer does not need to manage bank accounts, cash, checks, or credit cards as this is all handled through HACCD. The treasurer reviews HACCD information and presents the report to the Board each month.

Desirable Characteristics:

- · Good attention to detail
- Responsible will need to turn in expenses immediately for repayment.
- Timely in communication to other board member inquiries.
