What to Do About Deteriorating Properties

Our neighbors in the Armour Fields Homes Association may have noticed that a few of our properties may have been vacated due to the difficult economic times, and perhaps are not being as well kept as they might be. Homes that are abandoned or unoccupied, or homes which are in serious disrepair, can be of particular concern, of course.

If you are interested in maintaining neighborhood property values, and if you have concerns about the upkeep and condition of a home in your area, you can complain to the City. To initiate a complaint process, call the Neighborhood Preservation Division, (816) 513-9010. Keep in mind that the City has many such complaints pending now, and there is no guarantee of swift action, but dramatic cases are being addressed as time and resources permit.

If there is a possible code violation on a property, you can call the 3-1-1 Action Center of the City Manager's Office, (816) 513-1313 or 311. Typically an issue can be resolved through this process, but it does take time. For details on the resolution process, visit http://www.kcmo. org and search for "code violations".

The Armour Fields Homes Association has no obligation to maintain properties, of course, but the board members are concerned about any deteriorating properties so you can feel free to talk with any member of the board of directors (see list on back page of this newsletter) about any particular properties.



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Safe and Secure

It is getting to be that time of year again, where lights sparkle, Nativities are set up, garland is hung and criminals start looking for new targets. But your house does not have to be one of the targets.


There are several things that you can do to protect your home during this holiday season.

The first thing to do is audit the exterior of your home for lighting. There are things that you can do to ensure that your lighting fills your needs without being overwhelming.

Lights should be placed to illuminate areas of access to your home like doors and low windows. Dusk to dawn sensors can turn the lights on for you automatically. Motion detectors are a good option if you do not want to illuminate the area all night. There are some good low cost screw in motion detectors and dusk to dawn sensors if you don't want the hassle of having new lights installed. If you are "going green" with compact fluorescent bulbs (see article on page 9), make sure you get sensors that are compatible.

Another important thing to remember is to eliminate hiding places, if you have high bushes it can be easy for a criminal to have concealment when trying to enter.

Keeping hedges trimmed back can make your house a less welcoming target.





Don't put your valuables on display, leaving blinds and curtains open in the evening hours can make you a target. Drive by your house in the dark and take a look at what you are showing. It may surprise you what everyone can see. You can decide at that point if you need to cover the windows or even rearrange the furniture.

And at the risk of getting myself in trouble...it may even give you that reason to redecorate!

It is tempting in the winter months to put your trash out the night before to avoid that cold morning walk to the curb, especially if you have lots of large boxes. I've said it in past issues, but it bears repeating; if you must put that large box out, break it down, turn it inside out, and put it out the morning of the pickup. That way you won't be advertising to criminals who want to shop from your living room.

Armour Fields Homes Association is here to help you with your security needs the holiday season also. We will be increasing security patrols and watching activities closer than ever.

Don't forget, if you are going out of town on vacation call our security service, Chesley Brown (see phone number on the first page of this newsletter) and they can set up a special watch on your home for you!

mind. Your bags of yard waste should be set out by your curb by 7:00 a.m. that day.

Remember that there is a 20-bag limit for bags or bundles of yard waste. The materials should be in paper bags only (no plastic), and brush should be bundled in sizes of no larger than 4 feet by 2 feet, tied with twine only (no tape). No regular trash will be picked up on those days.

If your items are not picked up within 24 hours, you can call the City action line at 3-1-1 to make a report.





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


Using CFL Light Bulbs

Switching from traditional incandescent light bulbs to compact fluorescent light (CFL) bulbs is an effective and simple change that we can all make to use less electricity and help prevent greenhouse gas emissions. CFL's use up to 75 percent less electricity, last ten times longer, and can help our environment.

However, there are some things you should know about CFL's. One is that they contain a small amount of mercury in the glass tubing, so be careful if the bulb is dropped or broken. Sweep up -- don't vacuum -- a broken bulb.

Likewise, recycle all CFL bulbs once they do burn out. The City of Kansas City accepts CFL bulbs at its recycling locations, including the Bannister Community Recycling Center at 91st and Hillcrest Road, near the old Bannister Mall shopping center. If you must throw a bulb away, put it in two plastic bags.



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Neighborhood Reminders

• Are there any leftover signs in your lawn that no longer serve a purpose, such as painting or contractor signs or political signs? Your fall yard cleaning is a good time to take them down and help beautify our neighborhood!

• If you are about to dig a hole, please call 8-1-1 to check for underground utilities before sticking that spade in the ground. In its ever to make its bureaucracy more management, Missouri has introduced a simplified process for checking the location of utilities. This number will connect you to a central clearing house for any site in the state.

• Beware of solicitors or salesmen in the neighborhood who may actually be casing your houses for future burglaries. Theses salesmen often are peddling alarm systems, phone systems and satellite television services. Many offer "free installation" with "low monthly fees." One recent group, posing as cable technicians, notified residents not to be alarmed if strangers were in their back yards; the announcement proved to be an attempt to clear the way for a series of back-door burglaries. While some salespeople are legitimate, be careful and report any suspicious activity to the Kansas City police department. Also, a "No Soliciting" sign may help.

You Can Drop Off Leaves and Brush at City Facility

If you have more leaves than the City pickup (see page 8) or your private leaf pickup service can handle, consider dropping them off at the City's leave and brush facility just south of I-470 on Raytown Road.

Each Kansas City residence may drop off up to five leaf and brush sacks at no charge per week. For each bag beyond the five bag limit, a \$1 fee is charged. Residents must show proof of residency.

Each residence is also allowed two nocharge drop-off loads per year that are bedlevel of a pickup truck or below. (The equivalent of three cubic yards.)

No-charge loads can be brought in cars, vans, trucks or trailers, they are not to exceed three cubic yards. Additional loads can be dropped off at \$10 per load.

In an effort to repair the historic brick columns at Meyer Boulevard and Wornall Road, the Greenway Fields Homes Association has launched an aggressive fundraising campaign to help offset the costs for the project. Greenway Fields has done so even though the columns are not within its association boundaries.

Katie Allison, a representative of the Greenway Fields Homes Association, reports that the organization submitted a PIAC (Public Improvement Advisory Committee) request to the City of Kansas City, of which \$26,500 was received in May of this year. In addition, some other private donations have been made.

The columns are traditionally the responsibility of the Kansas City Parks & Recreation Department, but with

budget shortfalls, no money could be allotted for the project. In order to adequately repair the crumbling brick and iron work, it is estimated that costs could range from \$45,000 to \$90,000, leaving at the very least a \$12,000 to \$15,000 shortfall.

Greenway Fields Homes Association is asking residents in neighboring homes associations for private contributions. The Brookside Merchants Association and some of our sister homes associations have also made contributions.
