
# Furry Bear

#### SAFE and SECURE by Ron McMickle, Chair Safety & Security

Crime statistics: I review several sources of crime stats as well as alerts of a time-sensitive nature on a weekly basis. Some of you who receive the KC Star and read the Neighborhood News section may remember the Neighborhood Watch portion in that supplement showing recent crime activities. This report is somewhat dated and is not always published weekly, but it does give you an indication of the date, type of crime and block where it occurred. I now rely on weekly stats sent from the KCPD directly for their Metro Patrol Division Area. This area is huge, roughly bordered by Bannister Road on the south, on the north by  $63^{rd}$ ,

on the west by State Line, and on the east by 71 Highway. The AFHA is about 1/100 of this Metro area and statistically speaking has less than 1/4 of 1 per cent of the crime. (Of course, some crimes are committed by individuals passing by, not crimes against people or property in the AFHA.) The figure also includes reports from Southwest High School. In reviewing these reports, I will send alerts of activity in the area via our block captains. Please help us in reporting suspicious activity to Chesley Brown, our contracted security company, at 816-753-2945, or to the KCPD at 911.

Recent Activity: Several reports of salesmen in the area in the last 4 to 6 weeks have resulted in calls to Chesley Brown security. Some of the salesmen are very aggressive and seem unable to take a polite "No, thank you" for an answer. If this occurs, or if you feel threatened or pressured, please contact Chesley Brown.

Regarding salespeople in general soliciting in AFHA, legally they are allowed access provided they have applied for and received a permit to do solicitations in Kansas City. The board is currently attempting to receive a copy of the permit so that we can distribute an image of the permit to our residents. In the meantime, you may ask to see a copy of the permit to see if the organization has gone through the proper procedures. ◊

### "Operation Pawntrace"

The Kansas City Missouri Police Department started this program to alert citizens about the importance of recording the serial numbers of personal property.

Approximately 30,000 property crimes are reported each year in Kansas City, Missouri. The overwhelming majority of these crimes involve the theft of property from law-abiding citizens. The chances of being the victim of a property crime are far greater than any other crime. You can help fight these types of crimes by recording the description and serial numbers of your personal property.

This is a program conducted by the Kansas City Missouri Police Department, as well as numerous other police agencies all over the United States. You simply mark your property with your Missouri Driver's License Number, followed by KCMO, (Example 123456789KCMO), by using an engraver. (Never use your Social Security Number as an identifier.) If your property is lost or stolen, it can be traced back to you by the police. Simply mark your property with an engraver, inventory the items, recording the make, model, and serial number, as well as where you marked the item. Then place your property list in a safe place, so that if you ever need to provide the police with the information, you have it. This program works, but only if you mark your property and record the serial numbers. The following is



an example of how this program could work for you.

Let's say that you are out for the evening and a thief enters your residence, steals your TV and VCR, and leaves the area in a vehicle. Several miles away from your house the thief pawns your property at a pawn shop. The pawn shop employee enters the information into a database accessible to the police department. This database is checked daily by property crimes detectives. Once you file a police report with the requested information, the pawned items can be located, along with suspect information. If you do not mark your property, the thief, and your property may not be recovered.

The KCPD is committed to working with our citizens, neighborhoods, and businesses to make Kansas City a better place to live. Contact your Community Interaction Office for more information. ◊

# Preventing Crime during the Holidays

Every year at this time, the Armour Star publishes information about how to prevent crimes such as burglary and theft. Here again are the recommendations of the KCPD, published with the hope that our residents will enjoy a safe end to 2012 and an equally safe 2013!

 Make sure that all windows and doors are secure.
 If you have an alarm system, use it.

3. Utilize lights inside and outside your home. Use timers and motion sensors.

4. Make sure your neighbors know when you will be gone.5. Have neighbors or friends collect your mail, newspapers, and door hangers while you're away.

6. Keep bushes trimmed down to prevent hiding places and trees trimmed up for good visibility.

7. Install deadbolt locks with 3/4 inch throws.

8. Install strong doorframes.

9. Be a good neighbor; watch out for one another.

10. Record the license and description of any suspicious vehicle or persons.

11. Don't leave garage doors open.

12. Keep packages out of view from open windows.
13. Record all serial numbers and take part in the Kansas City Missouri Police Department's "Operation Pawntrace"
Program. (See left.) ◊
