Late Breaking News

The Kansas City Public School Board has announced that the Walmart proposal to buy the Bingham School property to build a neighborhood market in Waldo has been refused. This is great news for the area. The board is giving up a lot of money to preserve this valuable land from this type of commercial use. The building, which studies have determined is not salvageable, will be scheduled for demolition, probably next year.

There were many voices at the town hall forum at Southwest HS calling for the KC School board to consider building a new middle school on that site if the Hale Cook School continues to grow, as expected. If Hale Cook does succeed, there will be a need for a local middle school in a few years, there are currently no viable educational options for those families.

The KC schools are on track to obtain provisional accreditation. If the expected improvement continues, full accreditation could be achieved as early as next year. The school district has made major improvement in the last two years remains on a path of which we all can be very proud.

Possibly the best news of all that the school board seems to be listening to the voices of the people it serves. Strong public schools will give families with small children one more reason to remain in Armour Hills and surrounding areas enhancing our neighborhoods.

Parks and Islands

In the past few years, we have made many additions and improvements to our parks and islands. We tuckpointed stone and brick walls, cleaned and restored the statues and urns, added new lighting, new flowerbeds, trees and plants. Residents have used them to practice casting their fly rods, for throwing footballs, to play Barbies on a blanket under a shade tree, for Girl Scout meetings, graduation parties, marriage proposals and even a wedding. It is fun for us to be sure they are ready for your special event if you call ahead of time.

This year we have cleaned up ice and snow damage to the trees, replaced items we lost due to the hot, dry weather last year, trimmed trees and focused on maintenance and watering. We will be planting more trees and spring-blooming bulbs this fall, but we will not be doing any major new work unless we have donations to our City of Fountains fund.

Next spring, if we don't blow the budget on storm clean-up, we hope to have enough money to paint the bollards at Romanelli Park, touch up paint on the canopy at 65th and Valley, paint the utility boxes in Ward Parkway Park and trim and plant more trees. Some neighbors have asked If we plan to paint and plant around the new utility boxes in the right-of-ways down Wornall, Valley, and Penn. If you agree, let me hear from you. We set the budget in February and March.

Special requests:

Please do not allow your dogs to use our boxwoods as stand-ins for fire hydrants—whether it is your early morning jog with your black dogs down Ward Parkway or your afternoon stroll to Cherub Island with your little light brown dog. Every time we lose a shrub to your bad pet-parenting it means we can't add trees or flowers somewhere else--7 so far this year.

Ditto the dark-haired woman who helped herself to the exotic parrot tulips on the islands in the spring, then in June clipped so many pink roses from the bushes on the south end of the Armour Fields marker at Ward Parkway park that we almost lost those 3 new rose bushes we had just planted to replace after we

Safety and Security

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself. I have lived in the neighborhood for six years and was recently elected to the Armour Fields Homes Association Board of Directors. I will be responsible for safety and security. In that capacity I have been maintaining contact with Chesley Brown, the private security service that patrols Armour Fields, the Kansas City Police Department and others in the neighborhoods that surround ours. When I learn of any significant crimes or incidents that have occurred in the area from these sources I will send out an email that will be distributed to the neighborhood via the Block Captains. If you are not on one of these distribution lists and would like to be added so you can receive security updates please let me know. It is very important that we are all aware of any crimes that occur in our neighborhood and watch out for each other. If you see anything that you think seems suspicious please call the Police at or Chesley Brown at 816.753.7973.

The security topic that I would like to focus on in this edition of the Armour Star is pedestrian and auto safety. It appears to me that in this neighborhood more people walk in the streets than on the sidewalks. I understand that some people are concerned about tripping on cracks, sliding around on sweetgum tree balls or strollers bouncing around on uneven surfaces so they choose to walk in the street. However, the street is for automobile traffic. I have seen people running and walking in the middle of the major streets in the neighborhood with headphones and they don't even seem to realize or care that cars are coming up behind them. Besides being unsafe

it is also inconsiderate. On one occasion early in the morning, just before full sunlight, I was leaving my home and as I turned a corner I had to swerve to avoid hitting someone that was walking in the street. It did not help that there were trees and shrubs near the corner, my windows had fogged up slightly and the person was wearing dark colors. My point is that you should walk on the sidewalk when you can and if you must walk in the street use some common sense by wearing bright colors, stay to the side, keep your dogs close to your side and be aware of cars since they may not be aware of you.

A couple of other related items I wanted to discuss have to do with keeping trees and bushes near sidewalks, drives and streets clear. As I walk around the neighborhood I am surprised at the number of people that allow tree branches to grow and hang low over sidewalks. This not only looks bad but can also pose eye injury risk to walkers and may even push people to walk out in the streets. Also, if you have bushes, trees or shrubs that are near driveways, sidewalks, streets and corners special attention should be paid to make sure they are kept trimmed. This should be done not just to keep a tidy appearance but also to eliminate any visual barriers that could block the sight of drivers and pedestrians. If you or one of you neighbors has low hanging branches or other vegetation that is an obstruction and are physically unable to cut them please let me know and I will be happy to do it and take away the trimmings.

If you have any safety and security related questions or suggestions please let me know.




What's Next:

NUISANCE SIGNS, AN OLD CITY CODE WITH NEW LEGS

3 members of the Armour Fields board attended a KCMO "nuisance sign" training session with the Armour Hills board this August. Nuisance signs include ANY sign in the right of way or attached to a utility pole or street sign not put there by the city or a utility to give direction. Everything else has to be 10' inside the curb--both curbs if on a corner. This includes real estate signs, fundraising event signs, run/walk/marathon signs, nail salon signs, deck, construction, house cleaning, soccer camp, oriental rug sales, estate sales... ALL signs. Anyone who lives in KCMO can pull and dispose of a nuisance sign, but if you take a photo and send it to John Parks at john.parks@kcmo.org, who heads the city department in charge of enforcement, the city will send a

letter, asking the responsible party to remove the sign within 2 days. If they do not, the city will remove the sign or call us to pick it up for them and send a \$25 fine for the first offense. The fines multiply for each sign, which is considered a separate offense. We have a mild problem with this compared to some busy intersections in the city, but the code will be applied to everyone. It is going to be very expensive for some companies and marketing firms until they stop using these mini-billboards to clutter up the city.




