many residents stopped by and took advantage of this new event. Yours truly was reminded by Betty Bauers of my wilder days as a rambunctious six-year-old here in Armour Fields. All of the events here in the neighborhood are a great chance to make new connections with neighbors and continue the sense of community with those we have known for many years.

In other news there are some issues that need all of our attention. First, there needs to be a serious discussion about the direction of education in Kansas City. We are directly affected by this as Southwest High School resides within our borders. The uncertainty has grown with the loss of accreditation for the district and the severing of ties by UMKC and the other SWECC partners. In the coming months we will have to be flexible as the course of the district changes and make sure our voices are heard with regards to decisions made by the school district and the state board.

The second issue I would like everyone to be aware of is redistricting. With the current map that the City Council passed, our neighborhood is going to be moved into the sixth district, along with other neighborhoods up to 59th street. This will effectively break the Brookside neighborhood into two different council districts. Several people called and wrote Councilwoman Jan

Marcason voicing their concerns, but she chose to vote to remove us from her district. There are other options that we are exploring with other neighborhood leaders and will keep you updated through the block captains and on the Armour Fields Homes Association Facebook page. ◊

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AUTUMN SPECIAL EVENTS: LEAF AND BRUSH CLEAN-UP

Feeling blue as you gaze out your window and see only yellow and gold leaves covering your once beautiful green grass? Depressed that your garden has an over-abundance of fallen leaves, dead flowers, and overgrown shrubs? What about those bags full of leaves and brush rotting in your garage while you wait for Kansas City's winter leaf and brush pick-up?

Well, the City of Kansas City feels your pain (yes it's true) and has developed the Neighborhood Clean-up Assistance Program to help lift your spirits. Dumpsters are made available to recognized neighborhoods (April – October) so that residents have a handy place to discard unwanted leaves and brush. The cost is \$55 per dumpster, and the City supplements the balance of the actual \$300 cost.

The Armour Fields Homes Association Board of Directors tapped into this program in 2010. Three dumpsters were placed at 69th and Pennsylvania in April 2010 and again in October 2011. Both were very successful events, and we hope that even more residents will take advantage of the program in the future.

The guidelines are basically the same as for the City's Curbside Leaves and Brush Collection. The advantages of our collection are several: there is no limit per household; participants can collect the leaves and brush in plastic bags and empty them into the dumpsters; and branches do not need to be bundled. Grass clippings and logs are non-acceptable items.

The October 29th event had a steady stream of residents dumping unwanted debris. Many thanks to board members who were on site the day of the event. Brian Hand went the extra mile by gathering neighbors' yard waste in his truck and unloading it into the dumpsters. We had a new volunteer, Craig McKim, who assisted neighbors throughout the event. Thanks for lending a very helpful hand, Craig!

The dates for the 2012 Leaf and Brush Cleanup will be posted in the Armour Star and through your friendly Block Captain announcements. Don't miss next year's events!! You will be glad you didn't. ◊

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

MONEY MATTERS: Treasury Report

Understanding the Association's Billings and Expenditures

Armour Fields Homes Association (AFHA) is comprised of 788 homes. Each property covered by AFHA is responsible for a \$90 base assessment (Mandatory) and \$75 Security Charge (Optional). Members are billed annually on April 1st, with the option to pay half upon receipt and the remaining balance billed on October 1st. Our fiscal year runs April 1st to March 31st. The Base Assessment pays for administrative expenditures and expenditures that make Armour Fields a desirable location to live. These include items such as the association's insurance premiums, legal fees, Armour Star Newsletter, Annual meeting costs, community building events like Oktoberfest, member directories, postage, utilities, landscape maintenance, fountain preservation, and administration fees paid to the Homes Associations of Kansas City.

The security charge pays for safety and security related expenditures concerning the Continued on page 7.


association. By paying this charge, your monies fund Chesley Brown security patrols, removal of view-obstructing plant materials, and signage. In the winters when we receive an above-average amount of snow, the association uses money from the security fund to plow and salt the association's streets, thereby providing emergency vehicles a faster and safer route to our homes. While residents in associations surrounding Armour Fields navigate icy roads, Armour Fields residents are able to commute safely within the neighborhood on exposed blacktop.


Did you know?

- Are you aware that the City of Kansas City, Missouri does not provide for the maintenance of our parks, islands, or fountains? Your base assessment keeps our association beautiful by allowing us to perform the budgeted \$25,000 of basic maintenance, \$6,000 in deferred maintenance and \$5,000 in improvements for our parks, islands, and fountains. This year the parks and islands committee and the treasurer are working together to determine the total amount of existing deferred maintenance. The preliminary estimate is nearly \$30,000.
- Did you know you can improve your

neighborhood through a tax-deductible gift? The AFHA has a fund with the City of Fountains Foundation. This fund allows the AFHA to make capital improvements on our parks and islands. It is critical that you specify that your gift is to be used for the Armour Fields Homes Association if you want Armour Fields to be able to access the funds to make improvements and/or cover deferred maintenance. 

SAFE AND SECURE

Here we are getting ready for another holiday season and with it come parties, vacations, gifts, visitors and more. Here are a few tips to stay safe and secure this holiday season:

Vacations – If you plan on going out of town for the holidays this year it is a good idea to call our security provider Chesley Brown before you go. They can provide special watches of your home at no charge for those who pay the nonmandatory security assessment, but they don't know to watch if you don't call. It is always good to have a trusted neighbor or two watching out for your home while you are away too! Be careful to not advertise specifics about your absence on social networking sites like facebook; this can be a treasure trove of information for would-be burglars.

Shop Safely – If you do a lot of shopping online, only shop at trusted sources and make sure you protect yourself from identity theft. Have specific delivery information when you can so your packages are left in inconspicuous places, many items are stolen right from people's front doors after delivery. When shopping locally, make sure you keep your packages hidden from view if you have to leave them in the car between errands, and always remove your items from the car when you get home.

No Invites - Don't invite

criminals into your home. Keep expensive items out of view from windows. Other invites include poorly lit entrances outside your house and places for criminals to hide. Finally, make sure that you wait until the morning of trash pickup to put out the boxes that big ticket items come in and make an attempt to hide the contents by turning the box inside out.

Travel Right – Make sure that you plan ahead. Know the route that you are going to take, and travel during daylight hours when possible. Have emergency contact information for the states you are driving through handy, to include the highway patrol and roadside assistance numbers at a minimum. Let a friend or family member know where you are going and when you will be getting there and provide them with the route if they don't know it. Finally, don't forget to have an emergency kit in your vehicle. ◊



WHO YA GONNA CALL? CHESLEY BROWN!

The AFHA uses the optional security fee many of you pay with your dues to pay for a private security service to keep us safe. If you've seen their white SUVs patrolling your street, you know that Chesley Brown International is doing a great job providing round-the-clock, random patrols of the AFHA. Their officers have assisted Kansas City, Missouri police officers apprehend crime suspects and are extra vigilant around Southwest.

AFHA RESIDENTS, CITY LIAISON WORK FOR STREET IMPROVEMENT

The City of Kansas City responded this fall to requests by the AFHA to improve street safety in our neighborhood. For some time, the double yellow do-not-cross/two-waytraffic lines as well as the 18-inch white stop lines on the outbound-traffic side on 69th Street at Edgevale and Wornall had been missing. The absence of the traffic lines was a source of worry; the intersection was confusing to drivers unfamiliar with the proper flow of traffic at this entrance to the neighborhood, leaving open the potential for an accident. In fact, there had already been several close calls.

Concerned about the safety of drivers, AFHA resident Ron McMickle contacted Board President Brian Hand to see if something could be done and City Liaison John Murphy took on the task of communicating with the city.

Initially, John was told there was no money for repairs; however, the city generously reallocated money and a contractor applied the traffic lines on September 12.

The story doesn't stop there, though; a real-life mystery ensued. On September 25 portions of the lines disappeared. The contractor returned and reapplied the lines (at a cost to taxpayers of \$2,000). Then, on September 30, a vandal removed the lines on 69th Street and left them in a storm drain, which cost KCMO taxpayers another \$2000. After the second episode, the contractor reapplied the lines, using a procedure to make them much more difficult to remove and discourage further tampering. To date, no information about a perpetrator has been forthcoming, but neither has further damage to the traffic lines been reported, and the Great Intersection Mystery remains unsolved.
