Since last year's Dumpster Day was so successful, we have decided to add a second dumpster for leaves and brush. Yard waste needs to be in paper bags or thrown loose into the dumpster. You may bring yard waste in plastic bags but, the bags must be emptied into the dumpster and then taken away. **No** plastic bags may be thrown into the dumpster.



Items that will **NOT** be accepted in the **trash** dumpster include; tires, appliances, leaves or brush, or hazardous waste (this includes paint and paint products, garden products, automotive fluids, batteries or any household chemicals.)

We will not be allowed to overload either dumpster. Once full, we will no longer accept any more materials. For this reason, it might be wise to plan your drop off early in the morning.

Church Bells

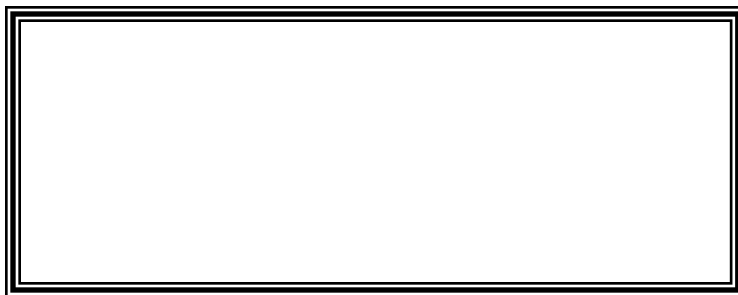
