

they wanted to stay in the city. Because of the architecture, proximity to Loose Park, Brookside and the Plaza, the Daws decided upon the CCDH area.



NEW BULKY ITEM PICK-UP RULES

As of September I, 2008 you will need an appointment with the city's trash department if you want bulky items picked up. If you see a neighbor putting out bulky trash, you may not assume that the city will also pick up yours unless you have called to give them your specific address and what items you will have at the curb. To schedule an appointment call the City Action Line at 311 or 816-513-1313. Appointments need to be made at least 48 hours in advance. Bags and boxes are not accepted (use regular trash.) Items must meet the guidelines for large item collection. For more information go to www.kcmo.org and scroll down to "bulky item collection."

The city of Kansas City, Missouri collects up to twenty sacks or bundles of leaves and brush (not grass clippings) from residences at the curbside each spring and fall. Our homes association spans the Central Schedule and the South Schedule. Sixty third street is the dividing line.
