Corinth Hills Property Values are Looking Good

As residents of Corinth Hills we have all been wondering how our neighborhood has been weathering the changing real estate market this year. We have watched as homes on our different blocks have hit the market and sold quickly. Over the last 6 months 25 homes have been on the market. Prices have ranged from 180 thousand to 590 thousand dollars. Many of the homes have sold quickly, illustrating the popularity of this southern quadrant of the city of Prairie Village.

We can list many reasons for the popularity of Corinth Hills and its place in Prairie Village's surging real estate market. The pride that home owners show by caring for their homes and yards are a contributing factor. The wonderful common areas and entrance gardens sets the tone as commuters and visitors explore our streets.

Our quaint tree lined streets – the close proximity of many schools, parks and other amenities – the revitalizing of the Corinth Square stores and restaurants, are all factors attracting home buyers to this area of the city.

The very low interest rates on home loans, 3.65%, for a 30 year fixed loan as of the writing of this article, is another positive factor that is motivating home buyers all over the Johnson county area. All signs point to Prairie Village and Corinth Hills to continue to lead the way in the real estate recovery.

The Prairie Village "Street Tree Project"

The Corinth Hills Homes Association recognizes the value of our street trees that were part of our original sub-division plans. We are now in the process of inventorying, evaluating and planting additional street trees to maintain and improve our property values.

Why do we have street trees?

Beautification and improved property values are usually what comes to mind first. But that is only part of the story. Trees cool in the summer and lessen heat loss in the winter saving us energy and cash. They are key players in storm water management, providing storm water

re-mediation and soil stabilization. They provide homes for birds. And most importantly, they improve air quality and provide carbon sequestration. What a deal. You have to smile when you drive into our area from the south where trees are not as plentiful. Not only is it more peaceful, you will love watching the thermometer drop a couple of degrees as you enter the shade of the trees.

What is a street tree and do I have one?

A tree planted in a city right of way or easement. Call Deborah Nixon at 913-341-0244 to verify street trees at your address.

Who maintains street trees?

Street trees are pruned for deadwood larger than 2 inches in diameter and hazards by the city on a cyclical basis – 3 to 5 years depending on the city budget. Additional pruning, watering and other maintenance are the responsibility of the home owner. Street trees can only be removed with the approval of the city and penalties apply if you do not obtain approval. Contact Public Works if you have questions regarding an existing tree at 913-385-4647 or e-mail public works@pykansas.com.

How do I get one?

Corinth Hills is evaluating our street trees and will be working with the city to plant additional trees where appropriate (meet code requirements). If your property qualifies, you will be notified to see if you are interested in having the homes association plant a tree of your choice from the city approved tree list. If you want us to evaluate your property sooner rather than later call Deborah Nixon at 913-341-0244.

Tips for Home Safety

Like many residents, one of the reasons that I live in Prairie Village and Corinth Hills is because of the safety and security. While merely living here gives one a greater sense of safety, there are a number of things that we can do to enhance the level of safety.

Here are a few: Always keep your garage door, interior door and front door closed and locked. Lock your windows and use an alarm system. If you park your car outside at night, keep the garage door opener out of sight. Burglars could use the opener to gain entry. Place your purse/wallet in a location out of view. Burglars are known to look into homes prior to breaking in to see what's easily available.

Report suspicious activity without delay. Officers are on duty 24 hours a day.

If going on vacation, stop mail and newspaper delivery or have a neighbor pick up the mail and newspapers. The Police Department has a House Watch Program. You can go online and fill in a form with contact and other information that lets the police know when you'll be gone and who is authorized to be there in your absence. 81st and Nall Island Entrance

Wow! The renovation of the 81st and Nall Island entrance into Corinth Hills provides an outstanding first impression of Corinth Hills. Because of deterioration of the



wood portion of the structure on the island, the wood section needed to be replaced. That and other maintenance needs led the Corinth Hills Association Board to enlist the services of Damon Comerio of Comerio Construction to do the renovation. What a terrific job contractor Comerio did! He rebuilt and replaced the deteriorated

wooden **entablature**, (the raised, horizontal architectural member that sets on top of and links the columns together), and stained it, repainted the Corinthian Columns, and redid the landscaping. The Corinthian columns and structure was originally constructed in 1958 when Corinth Hills was established. It was refurbished in the 1990s and now again in 2012. The Homes Association Board hopes you like the clean fresh look of the Corinthian Columns, the entablature, and the landscaping of the island.
