At the April 13 meeting we discussed the annual Northwood Trails Easter Egg Hunt held four days earlier. Pond Committee News

Greetings! I hope you're having a splendid spring. Your pond is out of winter dormancy. Our neighborhood water feature and the surrounding trails are rested and ready for walkers, runners, scooters, Striders, and bikers – with and without canine companions.

The pond's condition this spring and throughout the year is the result of volunteer hours from your neighborhood pond committee. On an April 2 work morning: Keith Read reinstalled aerator motors he had skillfully refurbished with new parts to give the aging motors the best chance of lasting another season; chairman emeritus Pat Madden piloted the dinghy and supervised a water treatment regimen focused on breaking down the slimy algae-feeding sludge at the bottom of the pond using hungry, beneficial bacteria; Tony Wittman cleared shallow areas of floating leaves, branches and debris; and Jason Hrabe pulled the ice signs and trimmed out a few dozen feet of fishing line snagged impossibly high in trees along the banks.

If you've got a young fishing enthusiast in your family, mark Saturday, June 18 on your calendar with a fish. The Pond and Social committees team up for this sporting morning every year. It's catch and release, but kid fishers can score a sweet prize for largest, smallest and most fish caught. Spectators are welcome and we would love your help staging the

event. Watch the Northwood Trails social networks in late May for a link to the sign-up sheet.

Speaking of young neighbors, a respectful request. The Pond committee's policy is rock-friendly: we love to skip stones and see a splash as much as anybody. Little rocks are fine, but we ask you and yours not uproot and toss the landscaping boulders from the spillway, pelt the steel cone drain or take rocks from adjacent private property.

Two items of note from the committee's April 14 meeting: We're seeking estimates on having the dock protected with a clear sealant. And we're considering the purchase of a bubbler system that would force compressed air through tubes to diffusers on the pond floor, shooting thousands of tiny bubbles toward the surface every second, oxygenating and cycling the water. The idea is that this device will work alongside the aerators to lessen the occurrence of algae to the point where we can put fewer chemicals into the water. This is projected to provide some relief from the sky-high costs Pond committee has seen for these additives over the past 16 months.

Thanks to Mr. Read, the committee is doing its due diligence researching vendors and prices that best suit Northwood Trails' needs and auditioning new suppliers with an eye toward vendors who can provide on-site installations and could even handle our chemical maintenance regimen should that be needed in the future.

If you have questions about the equipment under consideration, consider attending the May Northwood Trails board meeting.
