#### **Crime Prevention & Community Awareness**

The summer season is in full swing and the OMG block watch program has made great strides. In May, we had Officer John Trainor from the Kansas City Police Department address residents about safety issues and what we could do to prevent crime in our area.

One of the most important things as residents that we can do is to report suspicious activity. If you believe the call warrants immediate attention, call 911. If you do not believe that it is life threatening but does require an officer to be dispatched,

call the non-emergency number at 816-234-5111.

An example may be someone that doesn't belong on your street walking slowing (non-purposeful walking) that appears to "taking notes" on his or her surroundings.

Third, if you have witnessed something in the past that you did not act on but now you feel it may be relevant, call *Officer John Trainor at 816-349-6428*. He can also be emailed at JTrainor@kcpd.org.

Neighbors watching out for neighbors is our best

defense against crime (along with a few lights left on at night.)
