Fall Clean Sweep! Another opportunity for yard clean up in the autumn!


The Brookside Story - Shops of Every Necessary <u>Character</u> by LaDene Morton

LaDene Morton has written a wonderful book about Brookside from the beginning up to the 2000's. This book is a must read for anyone living in Brookside. The Brookside Story takes you through the early years of planning our community and an inside look at J.C. Nichols. She takes you through each decade beginning before 1920. The Brookside area was the incubator for the Country Club Plaza and Nichols tested all his plans here in our neighborhood first. LaDene has found some great photos of the area as it was being built. Beginning with pictures of the first building at 63rd and Brookside Boulevard (NE corner) being constructed in 1919, the pictures

continue with the lumber mill located onsite through 1949 and the various grocery stores of the 1960's.

The author takes us through the early years and the great fire when The Brookside Theater burned to the ground in January 1978. She writes about the people, the changes and how J.C. Nichols was ahead of his time.

As you read this book you will not only be proud of the history but how little the area has changed. I would



encourage everyone to read this book and soak in the great stories and history that we all share living in Brookside. You also catch a glimpse of various buildings that have been demolished.

LaDene has lived & worked in Brookside for 30 years and worked as a project manager for the Brookside Community Improvement District.

DOING VEHICLE-RELATED CRIME



"If I Were A Thief...I could break into your vehicle and steal your things, or the vehicle itself, in about the time it would take me to put this card under your windshield wiper."

"Your stuff could be gone that fast!"

If I Were a Thief to stop me, or simply convince me to victimize someone else."

ALWAYS LOCK YOUR VEHICLE WITH THE WINDOWS ROLLED UP. "Almost half the thefts I pull are from an unlocked vehicle. If a target is too hard – I will move on."

DO NOT LEAVE ITEMS OF VALUE IN PLAIN VIEW INSIDE YOUR VEHICLE. "I look for things like cell phones, radios, briefcases, laptops, purses, packages, CDs, GPS devices, and other stuff that means quick cash for me. Even loose change could attract me. You better take anything that looks valuable with you."

KNOW WHEN AND WHERE TO PLACE VALUABLES IN YOUR TRUNK. "I could be watching you arrive at your parking destination – so if you use your trunk, do so well before you park here."

IF YOU HAVE AN ANTI-THEFT DEVICE, USE IT. "I like to work fast and quietly; so I do not like an alarm being set, or a steering wheel "club" being put in place correctly."

DO NOT LEAVE YOUR KEYS IN YOUR UNOCCUPIED VEHICLE. "Even in a second—I could hop in your ride and be gone. I like to hang at convenience stores and I do not care if your kids have to go for a ride too."

REMOVE GPS UNITS/ELECTRONICS AS WELL AS THEIR INDICATORS (MOUNTS/CHARGERS ETC.) "Knowing people will simply place the device in console or glovebox, if I see indicators, I will still break in and take my chances. Once I have your GPS, I know where you live and frequent." Form 5801 EN P.D. (8-2009)

MAKE SURE THE LICENSE PLATES ON YOUR CAR ARE PROPERLY SECURED. "I can take your plates, put them on another vehicle, and commit a crime. That gives me your street identity. But if your plates are tightened-down, I will move on."

UPON DARKNESS, OR OVERNIGHT, PARK IN A WELL-LIGHTED AREA. "I prefer working unseen, so I tend to avoid bright lighting. Not only is your car safer, but you will be safer walking to it."

REMOVE SPARE CHANGE FROM CUP HOLDERS OR ASHTRAYS. "I have broken into cars for 35 cents in spare change costing you hundreds of dollars to fix your broken window."

REPORT ANY INCIDENT AS QUICKLY AS POSSIBLE TO POLICE. "Even if I do not commit a crime, by taking or damaging your property, the police need to know if you see me behaving suspiciously. You can make crime harder for me by sharing what you see with police, by calling 9-1-1."

IF YOU DISCOVER A CRIME HAS ALREADY HAPPENED, REPORT IT TOO. "Make a theft or damage report on your loss. Or, you can make life easy for me by not reporting your stuff was taken. No heat. Thanks, victim. If you want to see where I have been busy recently, and reports were made, go to www.kcpd.org and click on Crime Mapping. Theft of Vehicle, Theft-TFA (from auto), and Theft-ACC (attached to) are vehicle-related crimes on the map."

Wornall Homestead History

John Wornall House

Our neighborhood namesake is John Wornall, a gentleman farmer born in Kentucky. He moved to Missouri to farm with his father. John Wornall's first wife was Matilda, Her father, Rev. Thomas Johnson, founded the Shawnee Methodist Indian Mission in Kansas in 1831. John and Eliza had seven children. Eliza died on July 5, 1865, a week after the birth of her last child. She was 29 years old. On September 25, 1866, John married Eliza's first cousin, Roma Johnson. They also had two children who lived beyond infancy.

Wornall was one of the more prosperous farmers in Jackson County. The Kansas City Enquirer and Star listed him as one of the "Solid Men of Jackson County, "meaning one of those who paid taxes on \$10,000 or more. The 1860 census shows that John Wornall had four slaves and two hired hands. John Wornall was a leading citizen in Jackson County. He was one of the original members and president (in 1856) of The Jackson County Agricultural and Mechanical Association. The association, founded in Independence in 1853, sought to encourage better methods of farming and introduce superior types of crops.

John was active in the Baptist Church, serving as treasurer and moderator of the Big Blue (later Westport) Baptist Church. He was also a strong supporter of William Jewell College and acted as chairman of its Board of Trustees.

John Wornall co-founded the Kansas City National Bank in

1870. That same year he was elected to the state senate representing Cass, Jackson, and Bates counties. He served four years before declining renomination.

John Wornall's choice of design for his new house expressed many desires. Perhaps it spoke of his determination to civilize the frontier by evoking images of a more settled Kentucky. Perhaps the house was a tangible expression of his position in the community, four Greek columns and pediments were symbolic of aristocratic leadership in a slave society. Wornall's new house was also evidence of his financial stability; many men in the Kansas City area built brick homes when they could afford them. But Wornall's house went beyond providing shelter for his family. Wiley Britton, a young man hired to help build the brick farmhouse, recalled that Wornall had been living in a substantial frame house but desired to build "the most

pretentious house in that section." Wornall chose the site of his new showplace carefully—it was two hundred feet away from the main road that lead south from Westport and headed toward the Santa Fe trail. Passers-by could not help but think that the man living in this landmark house with 25 ft columns was successful. The total cost of \$4,505.69. The house was completed in 1858.

In 2010, the Wornall House and the Alexander Majors House became governed by same board in an effort to preserve historic properties which share such significant Jackson County history.
